<u>What is Labor Market Information?</u>– Information about the market where labor skills are exchanged for wages. Information can be descriptive (qualitative) or statistical (quantitative). The key elements in the labor market are the workers (labor resources) and jobs (employment opportunities).

<u>How to Find a New Career</u> – New to the job market? A step-by-step approach to determine your career interest and aptitude. Determine how much money you need to maintain your preferred lifestyle with <u>California Career Zone</u>. Learn about the best career for you based on your skills and interest using <u>Self-Assessment for Career Exploration</u>. Use <u>Make Money Choices</u> to create a budget for the lifestyle you want.

<u>California Career Resource Network</u> – Need a lesson plan, staff impact report card, middle or high school planning for college, or grade by grade career planning from 5th grade to 12th grade? The <u>California Department of Education</u> has the resources for you.

<u>California Occupational Guides</u> – Already have a job in mind to explore? Get a job description, job outlook, wages, qualification and education requirements, information on benefits, licensing, training, possible employers, and related occupations.

<u>Labor Market Information Help with Program Decision Making</u> – Guidelines for educators and trainers for gathering the labor market information you need for assessing the supply, demand, opportunities, and employers related to your occupational programs.

<u>Apprenticeships</u> – Identify apprenticeships by county and occupation.

<u>CalJOBS</u> – The State of California's comprehensive online job database which allows users to easily search for jobs, build resumes, and access career resources. Employers can post job ads, search for possible job candidates, and access resumes by skills, education, training, and experience.

Government Jobs – Interested in civil service? Explore employment opportunities with the <u>State of California</u> and <u>Federal Government</u>.

Job Fairs and Workshops – Locate job fairs and workshops throughout California.

<u>Office Locator</u> – Looking for help on your job search? Find the nearest One-Stop Center now known as America's Job Centers of California where you will have free access to computers, copy and fax machines, telephones, and individual services.

<u>Wages & Employment by Occupation</u> – Latest occupational wages by SOC code. Find specific occupations or SOC codes using occupational <u>Codefinder</u>.

<u>Projections – Industry & Occupation</u> – Click the Area Name to look up local projections by industry (NAICS) and occupation (SOC), including Occupations with Most Job Openings and Fastest Growing Occupations. Find specific occupations or SOC codes using occupational <u>Codefinder</u>.

<u>Career Match</u> – Identify careers with similar skills for a quicker career transition. Fosters transferable skills.

<u>Training Providers</u> – Data and links to information for educators and training facility administrators to help answer the question: what are the occupations and skills for which training should be provided?

<u>HWOL (Help Wanted OnLine)</u> Local Area Data - Compare the number of unemployed persons and the number of available job ads by county. Features information on the cities, employers, and occupations with the most job ads.

<u>Major Employers</u> – Locate major employers within your county. Information includes their address, telephone number, web site address, and industry description.

<u>Monthly Labor Force & Unemployment Data</u> – Access the most current labor force and industry employment data.

<u>O*NET OnLine</u> – Find occupations in specific industries, the green economy, STEM discipline, and occupations with bright outlook.

NAICS – Find industry classification of business establishments.

<u>Consultants by County</u> – Labor Market Consultants help workforce partners (such as Workforce Investment Act boards and staff, one-stop staff, educators, and those engaged in economic development) and employers find, access, and use labor market information and services.

<u>Glossary of Terms</u> - Common terms used in labor market information.
